Delhi: Aam Aadmi sweeps AAP out; **BJP Returns to Power after 27 Years**

Key AAP Leaders Arvind Kejriwal, Manish Sisodia, and Saurabh Bhardwaj lose

PUNE: In a surprising outcome in the 2025 Delhi Assembly Elections, the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) secured a decisive victory with 48 seats, leaving the Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) with only 22. While the seat difference was clear, the real story lies in the narrow vote share margin—45.56% for the BJP compared to AAP's 43.57%. This suggests a major shift in voter support, particularly in constituencies where AAP had previously held strong influence.

A significant portion of AAP's traditional middle-class base appears to have moved toward the BJP, playing a crucial role in sealing AAP's fate in the elections.

A key factor behind AAP's loss was growing disillusionment among its traditional supporters, particularly in the middle class. Dr. Vikas Pathak, Associate Editor of The Indian Express, noted, "The core reason for AAP's defeat stemmed from the ongoing conflict between the Lieutenant Governor (Vinay Kumar Saxena) and the state government, which led to the withholding of party funds. This conflict prevented the allocation of promised schemes, resulting in visible neglect of infrastructure, such as garbage dumps and broken roads. The middle class, AAP's major voter base, grew frustrated, which led to a shift in their support towards BJP."

Political analysts noted that this demographic, once a major pil-

After its spendid show in Delhi assembly election, the next big challenge for the BJP top leadership is to pick the next chief minister. There are several names doing the rounds, including Pravesh Verma, who defeated Arvind Kejriwal; Ramesh Bidhuri, who lost to current CM Atishi; MP Manoj Tiwari, Kapil Mishra, Ashisjh Sood, Rekha Gupta and Vijendra Gupta. However, many speculate that BJP may go for a low profile leader as it did in Rajasthan, Madhya Pradesh recently.

lar of AAP's success, shifted its allegiance to the BJP due to mounting frustration with AAP's governance. Dr. Sajjan Kumar, a political analyst, commented, "The middle class, which had once strongly supported AAP, became disillusioned due to unfulfilled promises, unresolved corruption issues, critical problems like public infrastructure and rising costs of living."

AAP's early promise of good governance and transparency had initially garnered widespread support, but its inability to deliver on these promises left many voters feeling betrayed. As governance stagnated, the perception of mismanagement grew, contributing to a weakening of trust, particularly among those who had hoped for transformative change. The middle class, once hopeful for a new political approach in Delhi, began to feel that AAP had failed to live up to its aspirations.

The "Sheesh Mahal" controversy, which revolved around

AAP leaders portraying themselves as common citizens while living in luxury, further damaged the party's credibility. This hypocrisy deeply resonated with voters who had seen AAP as a champion of the ordinary man. The party's failure to distance itself from this controversy, combined with a lack of tangible improvements in governance, left many of its core supporters disenchanted.

Compounding AAP's troubles was its decision not to form alliances with Congress, leaving it more vulnerable to BJP's strategic advances. Analysts believe that this, along with AAP's failure to replace incumbents who had lost local support, contributed to the party's weak performance in key constituencies. Several AAP candidates lost by narrow margins, indicating a significant portion of their traditional voter base either abstained or turned to the BJP.

One of the most closely contested races was in Jangpura,

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Pune's GBS Outbreak Escalates Due to Suspected PMC Inaction

Residents Remain Unaware of the Increasing Health Risks Despite the Deteriorating Situation Amid Lack of Action by PMC

PUNE: Pune is battling an outbreak, of the Guillain-Barré Syndrome (GBS), with over 158 cases as of February 2. and 5 suspected deaths. The prime suspect of the cause of the rising cases of GBS in Pune seems to be the presence of E.coli contamination in the water sources. Despite the worsening situation, the Pune Municipal Corporation (PMC) has yet to regulate private water tankers, leaving a critical oversight in ensuring a safe water supply.

Guillain-Barré Syndrome (GBS) is a rare neurological disorder in which a person's immune system attacks its nervous system causing symptoms like weakness in arms, face and breathing trouble with sensation changes in muscles along with various other symptoms too. According to the recent water quality tests in Pune's Khadakwasla Dam, the city's main water reservoir revealed higher E.coli contamination, making it dirty and contaminated.

Further investigations by PMC revealed contaminated water at the Parvati Water Treatment Centre and 15 private tanker filling stations found to be tainted with Campylobacter jejuni and norovirus, both known to cause severe gastrointestinal infections. Amid the surge

of rising cases in water-related concerns, Pune Municipal Corporation announced a licensing policy for Private water tankers and as per the policy, the private tanker operator will be required to provide details of the water source along with the societies they supply the water, along with their personal information.

However, in a contradictory statement, while the INK reporters were talking to Prasanna Joshi, Senior Superintendent of PMC Water department about the license

policy, he claimed, "No license will be issued to the private tankers right now," painting a completely different picture.

He claimed that a list of private water tankers primarily supplying water in the 23 villages including areas like Nanded, Khadakwasla, Nandoshi, Bavdhan, Sus etc all of which are under PMC will be provided 'bleaching powders' to kill the bacteria and the water will be further tested by PMC. Whereas, the government tankers have

already been chlorinated. He also mentioned that each of these private tankers, which provide water mostly around the 23 villages in Pune are being registered and surveys are also being held for these areas, but not in the main cities since it is the government tankers which supply water there.

Moreover, he also mentioned that although the water provided by these private tankers is usually not used for drinking purposes, precautions are still being

taken to ensure safety. Subsequently, Prasanna further touched upon the necessity of painting the private Sewage treatment plant to be painted green with 'not for drinking' and claimed it is happening properly.

However while speaking to some of the private water suppliers around Kothrud, Nanded and Had-Wapsar they mentioned that no such bleaching powder has reached them nor have they been informed of the same. Rajendra Manas Dhaulik, the owner of Manas Water Suppliers Hadapsar mentioned that the water they supply comes from bore wells and is safe enough to be used for drinking purposes.

While speaking to residents residing around Bavdhan, they seem to be reluctant as long as the water that comes to their houses is from RO UV-filtered purifiers. They also mentioned that most of the water around the Bavdhan and Kothrud area comes from Pashan Lake where thorough chlorination is being done by the Government.

There has been miscommunication within the PMC and the private water suppliers have not yet received any notices, nor any notifications about the testing process of these water tankers. People of Pune are still in hopes of new changes being implemented in the city with strict rules & regulations.

First Phase of the Pink E-Rickshaw Scheme to begin in Maharashtra Soon

The new scheme aims to empower women by providing employment and will enhance the safety of female passengers

PUNE: This year, the Maharashtra government plans to introduce the first phase of the Pink E-Rickshaw Scheme, a daring move towards women empowerment and safer urban mobility. These brand-new electric rickshaws, which are just for female drivers, are intended to give female passengers safe transit choices and create new job opportunities. The effort is starting in eight important districts, including Pune, Kolhapur, Solapur, Nashik, Nagpur, Amravati, Chhatrapati Sambhaji Nagar, and Ahilyanagar, with the ambitious goal of providing work for 10,000 women in 18 districts. The program represents an important step towards safe and inclusive public transportation in the state by fusing empowerment with sustainability. This will also promote women jobs at vocational workplaces. .

Last year, Deputy Chief Minister Ajit Pawar announced this initiative when he presented the supplementary budget for the year 2024-2025. According to the Maharashtra government website, Rs 80 crore has been allocated for executing the scheme. The primary perk of this scheme is the financial support that the government provides to its beneficiaries. Ashok Chavan, Dis-

trict Coordinating Officer at Mahila Arthik Vikas Mahamandal, said, "The total cost of the rickshaw is Rs 3,73,000. 70% of this cost is a bank loan, 10% will be paid by the beneficiaries which will be around Rs 12,300 and the remaining 20% will be the government subsidy."

As reported by the Indian Express, in Pune, a committee was formed chaired by the district collector, members from the

RTO, women and child development office, and the Mahila Arthik Vikas Mahamandal (MAVIM).

In a phone interview with INK reporters, Manisha Biraris, Pune district women and child development officer stated, "This new scheme aims to empower women, as it will help them earn money. They will get to talk to people, and learn how to manage finances such as saving and spending mon-

ey." She also added that to apply for such schemes, interested people must submit the application form offline with all additional documents ready. This will include documents such as AADHAR card, PAN, voting, schooling certificate, bank account details, etc.

To spread awareness about the scheme and gain more beneficiaries, Biraris stated that they're hosting demos for the e-rickshaws in certain areas like Lonavala and Baramati. Moreover, Anganwadi workers across Pune have been asked to inform people about the benefits of the scheme. When asked about the success of gaining more applicants, Biraris said, "Through the demos and informing people in person, we have let the news about this scheme reach the people who we want to reach." While talking about areas where such e-rickshaws will function, Biraris said, "For now the routes will operate along the metro lines as they're the more heavily populated areas in Pune. Additionally, we'll also try to ensure that the rickshaws work in areas with security cameras available on the roads."

Saroj Potphode, a female rickshaw driver from Thane, when asked about why has such a scheme been implemented now, stated that, "The Government is trying to increase women's population in the workforce to become fully independent. I don't know much about this new scheme but this sounds like a good idea, we'll see how it functions once fully implemented." When asked when passengers can access these facilities in the city, Chavan noted, "We're currently in the final stages of inculcating this plan. Mostly, the autos will be seen on the road by the end of February this year in Pune."

PUNE: On February 3, 2025, over two crore pilgrims gathered at the holy Sangam for the third and final Amrit Snan of the Maha Kumbh Mela, creating a breathtaking scene in Prayagraj. The air was filled with chants and the spiritually vibrant atmosphere embodied the essence of this pilgrimage that occurs only once every twelve years.

Designated by UNESCO as an Intangible Cultural Heritage,

This digital engagement has amplified the reach of the festival, allowing followers to partake in the spiritual journey virtually. Is the 'Green Kumbh' a Reality or a Hoax on Ground?

Yogi-led govt's biggest project tries to deal with sustainable waste management & sanitation at Maha Kumbh

PUNE: The Maha Kumbh, a monumental event attended by 400-450 million people at the Triveni Sangam in Prayagraj, is recognized as a unique experience occurring after a 144-year cycle of Jupiter's full orbital revolution around the Sun. To manage a population as big as this would also require management teams and sanitation workers to keep the area sanitized and clean.

With several questions on the waste-management system at the Maha Kumbh Mela and the river Ganga being safe for a dip, the devotees, pilgrims, ascetics, and as well as tourists have expressed a mixed judgement...

With 1600 crore investment on sanitation, including 10,000 plus sanitation workers, 12000 plastic toilets, 16100 steel toilets, 20,000 trash bins, and 24/7 water supply through 200 water ATMs and 6500 tap stands, Prayagraj tries to follow the idea of Swachh Bharat while catering to the estimated 40 crore devotees visiting the Kumbh Mela.

With numerous teams of workers deployed to collect wastes and maintain hygiene at various areas and roads leading to the mela, devotees are puzzled with cleanliness index in Prayagraj. Madhusmita Tripathy, a visitor from Odisha, highlights the effective sanitation management she observed while traveling by road. "In every half

provided. Even emough taps are installed and everything is well maintained regularly," she remarked.

Another visitor from Madhya Pradesh, Vidhushi Sankhla, a student from Amity University, further added how even on a one-day visit she could see the cleanliness sustained in Kumbh with such a huge population, from instant hand-pickers collecting waste to proper treatment of waste and clean toilets. "On practical grounds to manage such huge population and also sustain cleanliness is not an easy task yet I saw the continuous efforts of sanitation workers to manage both and there were plenty of water tanks supplying clean water," she said.

The Ganga River where

km there are sufficient bathrooms thousands of devotees take a dip is continuously cleaned and disposed of sludge wastes by the waste management teams. Govind Kumar, who heads the control room of Jal Sang Vibhag in Prayagraj, shared the system of disposal implemented in Kumbh, "The unclean sewer waters of the rivers are sent to SDPs (Sludge Dewatering Plant) for treatment."

These sanitation and clean water services are made possible with thousands of workers and state corporations coming together and working to make Maha Kumbh Swachh for millions of people. He further added how actively they have been working, sometimes three days in a stretch to make sure the water supplies are met and the public doesn't face any sanitation or water issues.

The Maha Kumbh Mela 2025 tries to combat water and waste management, with large-scale investments, dedicated sanitation workers and advanced waste treatment to create a clean and hygienic environment for millions of devotees.

But on the flip side many visitors have repeatdely complained about unsaniytary living condition. Open-defacation, waste management, garlands and water bottles being one of the most important contibuting factors in littering. Even though a segment of populationm believes that Kumbh is achieving its aim of 'Green Kumbh', many people are disspointed at the arrangments making this issue subjective and differenty for different populations.

Budget 2025-26: Balancing India's Growth, Taxes and Welfare

Notable schemes mentioned under Union Budget 2025-26 are: Prime Minister Dhan-Dhanya Krishi Yojna, Modified Interest Subvention Scheme (for Kishan Credit Card loans)

36 lifesaving drugs and medicines for treatment of cancer and rare diseases have been fully exempted from Basic Customs Duty (BCD) along with specified drugs and medicines under Patient Assistance Programmes run by pharmaceutical companies, only if the medications are supplied free of cost to patients. The Budget has also made space to support domestic manufacturing companies especially MS-MEs by fully exempting Basic Custom Duty (BCD) on critical minerals that are not easily available in India.

Under MSMEs development initiative, the Government will provide a loan up to Rs 2 crore to women, Scheduled Caste and Scheduled Tribe who are first time entrepreneurs. In the SWAMIH

fund 2.0, an additional amount of Rs 15,000 crore has been allocated to quickly facilitate the completion of stalled housing projects for the middle-class families.

"The new tax regime will lift the burden of taxes from the shoulders of the middle class, increasing their disposable income, boosting consumption, savings, and investment," said Finance Minister (FM) Nirmala Sitharaman in the 2025 Union Budget introduction. FM kept her word on improving the income tax law, which she had hinted at her last Budget presentation in July 2024. With no income tax payable for annual incomes up to 12 lakhs, the Budget provides big reliefs to the middle class. Bimal Pan, a railway serviceman from West Bengal, expresses his relief, saying, "I really felt happy with the exemption limit now at rupees 12 lakhs, many of us in the middle-income bracket will have more disposable income. With more money in hand, I might consider purchasing things that I had postponed earlier." The tax slabs will give more purchasing power to the middle class, increasing consumption and thus increasing the Gross Domestic Product (GDP) of the country, strengthening the economic base.

The second important reform was made in the removal of tariff rates on customs duty on industrial goods and address duty inversion. "This tariff structure will support domestic manufacturing, promote exports, facilitate trade and provide relief to common people", said FM. Industrial products will have only 8 tariff rates containing zero rate, as seven others were already removed in the previous Budget. The FM also suggested applying proper cess (Central Excise and Service Tax) to preserve the effective duty incidence generally, with the exception of a few products where it will slightly decrease and only impose one surcharge or cess.

Budget was the reason for the sigh of relief for an entire strata

of the middle class population in India. The new income tax rate under the new regime declares no tax for any citizen up to the income of 12 lakh, yet there is a certain tax bracket attached to the slab which shows up to 10% for salaried employees up to 12 lakh.

To bust this confusion, Sayalee Jog, an economist clarifies the bracketed percentage saying, "Every salaried person, who are up to the 12 lakh bracket would still have to file their Income Tax Returns (ITR's), at the end of the fiscal year with the Income Tax Department. But what they (here, the government) are saying is that you file the tax and you get the rebate."

In layman terms, consider yourself to be a salaried employee whose tax gets deducted at source (TDS), does not exceed the 12 lakh bracket for which you have the right set of investments to show the Income Tax Department with which you can claim an exemption from the ATC (Application for Tax Cer-

tificate), the deducted TDS amount will then be rebated at the end of the fiscal year.

Citizens being worried about having to pay extra taxes even if you earn a single penny higher than the 12 lakh bracket can breathe because of the concept of marginal relief, which allows an individual earning up to 12.75 lakh an exemption from paying taxes. This is a progressive tax regime which has been really thoughtful about the middle class where debt management actually seems like a possibility.

The Finance Minister has briefed and allocated sector specific initiatives for the development of the infrastructure of India, keeping in mind the suggestions provided by the Annual Economic Review on 31st January, 2025. The Ministry of Railways has been allocated Rs 2.72 lakh crore for its modernization and expanding railway networks. With the aim to develop road transport and highway connectivity an amount of Rs 2.52 lakh crore has been fixed.





China Bans Export of Key Machinery to India, IT Sector Faces Major Delay

As China bans products in India, will India be able to overcome this challenge?

PUNE: China has declared a trade war against India, affecting the geo-political tensions between the countries. The solar and electric firms in India have experienced delays due to the restrictions of the Chinese government on exports of key inputs and machinery, an economist and the founder of Global Trade Research Institute, Ajay Srivastava said in an interview. He said that these curbs could be China's response to India's restrictions on Chinese investments and visas.

China has reached a new stage especially in developing the economy with greater innovation capabilities in its universities and many global companies. The combination of low costs and growing i nnovation capability, records an increasing number of Chinese companies, among the formidable global competitors. China's current export restrictions are part of its broader strategy to retaliate against United States sanctions on Chinese tech

In a conversation about the effect that is created on the IT sector due to the bans imposed by China on the exports of the products, an

economics scholar from Osmania University, Bharat Ram said, "India imports mainly electronic goods such as headphones and household appliances from China and with the ban being imposed the people cannot use electronic gadgets and appliances which will result in increased living costs and higher in-

Another economist from University of Hyderabad, Subramnyam said that "About 92% of raw materials of pharma raw materials come from China, all micro processors come from there, we assemble the parts in India and call it 'Made in India.' Right now we do not have the capability to make new processors for mobile gadgets. Neither does Russia, the United States of America, Germany or France. The reason being, all these countries outsource these products from China." He further added that, "The impact is not only on our country, but also on China, as it will be a big market loss like India where the manufacturing cost is much lesser compared to any other country, the demand is really high."

While talking about how these decisions will boost or destroy the economy, he said, "There are two sides to this issue and if we take into consideration the second side India does have a benefit in it. Chinese investments in roads, railways and ship equipment will be a major boost to the economy of China and infrastructure of India will take a back seat due to strained relationships between the two countries." Although India has stated that it will start manufacturing these products and will strengthen its relations with South Korea and Japan, this decision of China will either negatively impact the entire IT sector of India or make us self-reliant.

As Waqf Eyes Their Land, Locals in Kerala District Pin Hope on Waqf Bill

PUNE: As Waqf Board continues to stake its claim on 400 acres of land in Kerala's Ernakulam, locals are hopeful that the Waqf (Amendment) Bill, 2024, which is under consideration in the Indian Parliament, will bring them relief.

In Ernakulam, the Waqf Board claims rights over 400 acres of coastal land in Manambam, which is home to a large population of fisherfolks with a majority of them being Christians. Over 600 families have been living in the area for over 100 years. Ancy, a longtime resident of the area, said: "We have been paying taxes for all these years because we hold this property. We have a possession certificate for the same. They would not let us pay the tax from 2022. Now, they claim that this land belongs to Waqf Board."

The land in question was purchased in 1902 by Siddique Saith from the King of Cochin. Later in 1950, Siddique gifted this property to Farook College in Kozhikode, with all the right to use or sell this property. This caused tension between the college and the tenants, who were majorly Christian fishermen. In 1975, the High Court of Kerala ordered that this land be-



out-of-court settlement, the tenants exist in the management of Waqf purchased the land from the college in 1987.

Father Antony Xaviour, the priest of Velamkanni Matha Church, Manambam said to India Today that about 400 Christian families and 210 Hindu families live here peacefully. In 2022, the village office said that these people could no longer pay their land tax and now the claim is that they do not own this land. "The new amendment in the Waqf Bill is something that we will be looking forward to. It gives up hope," he added.

Shadab Shams, Chairman of a Waqf Board in Uttarakhand, said the board supports reforms in the Waqf Act for improved governance standards. "Our team ac-

Featuring over 30 national award-winning artisans, the haat presents an array of textiles, paintings, heirloom jewelry, and handcrafted treasures.

The event offered a chance for visitors to see and acquire masterpieces crafted by some of talented artisans, with tradition, skill, and artistry.

The owner of Monalisa Kalagram, Lisa Pingale, emphasised on the importance of the event and said, "This is for the first time that we have organized and hosted this bazaar completely on our own, we have hosted similar bazaars in the past as well but it was planned and executed by other organizations, this space created its own demand. We have collaborated with these traditional artists, coming from different backgrounds and villages all over India and gave them a platform to showcase their work. Niranjan, one of the artists here,

is a Unesco award winner and the saree I am wearing is his work."

Jonnalagadda Niranjan, a Unesco award recipient from Andhra Pradesh exhibited his Kalamkari work. He talked about the textile intricacies and legacies, "We design kalamkari sarees and stalls and, recently we have started creating kalamkari cushion covers and bedsheets too. I will continue to advocate and bring my family legacy forward ." Niranjan said.

Apart from an eye catching collection of textiles, the Virasat Karigar Haat also hosted a detailed exhibition of handcrafted

paintings that depicted the scenes of Hindu mythology along with carefully crafted pieces of jewellery that are a generational practice.

Vinay Kumar, a national award winner from Telangana talked about how his art was done on temple ceilings and walls during the 13th Century. He mentioned, "It depicts Ramayana and Mahabharata and all Hindu mythological stories like Krishna's Rasleela. During the 13th to 15th century this art was much popularized during the Vijayanagar Dynasty. When they were defeated in the 1540s by Tipu Sultan, my ancestors travelled to

Telangana and there were many stories, so as artisans we started creating visual paintings and the art was used for narrations. Until the 19th century this was very popular, however when the print media and movies started, slowly people became more interested in films and that's the reason storytellers lost their livelihood. This impacted artisans also."

Moving towards jewellery, Raghav Soni, the son of a Padma Shri winner, Raj Soni, discovered jewellery making is an intricate and time-taking process as he mentioned that, "Even a single piece of jewellery takes around 10 to 15 days to craft. This artwork originated around 400 years back when the kings used to give pieces of raw glasses to our ancestors and they would fuse gold and glass together to create delicate designs."

"The specialty about this craft is that it combines both glass and gold together so that they become one layer and the ornaments can be both jewellery and home decor items." Soni said. This exhibition included a vast array of intricate and unique artworks from different states of India that highlighted the importance of dedicated craftsmanship.
